



How to make: Make your bulletin board look like a sandwich cart. Make the bottom of the cart and its sides from brown paper. Attach black paper wheels. Use a strip of colored paper to make the awning. Fold the top edge of the strip, and staple it to the bulletin board to create a three-dimensional effect. Put the title “Sandwich Sort” on the awning.

Collect seven paper sacks and two sandwich containers from a fast-food restaurant. Label each of five sacks with vowel + |r| sounds. Label the other sacks *Compound Words* and *Homophones*. Tack the sandwich containers to the bottom of the cart, and label them *Student Sandwiches*.

How to use: Have students make “sandwiches” from construction paper. (See examples above.) They should cut out bun halves and several layers of filling, such as yellow cheese, red tomatoes, or green lettuce. Have them write a Basic Word on each layer of filling. Each “sandwich” should contain words of just one kind—words with particular vowel + |r| sounds, compound words, or homophones. Students build the “sandwiches” by gluing bun halves and layers of filling together against a cardboard backing. Store the “sandwiches” in the containers on the bulletin board. Then have students sort the “sandwiches” and put them in the correct sacks.
